

Finding a Physician to Conduct a Respirator Medical Evaluation

Whether you contact your personal physician or a local health clinic, you will need to ask if they can provide an “OSHA Respirator Medical Evaluation”, meeting the federal regulatory standard 29CFR1910.134. If so, tell them you have the OSHA questionnaire (unless they provide one) and a special Physician’s Approval Form required by the respirator fit-tester.
